FINAL VIRTUAL SERVICE, SUNDAY 5th: There was a real surprise on the part of the Church Council, meeting via zoom on Tuesday night, after they had watched so many of our older young people leading the last virtual 'Service of the Word' last Sunday. But where have they suddenly all come from?! The simple answer is: out of our policy of encouraging our young families to bring their children for Baptism and First Holy Communion and out the quality of our Sunday School. Where once they were babies crawling around on the carpet in the south aisle, now they are articulate members of the Church in their own right. And it's wonderful to have them!

So congratulations to all of those who took part last Sunday; we are just sorry that - due to Covid19 - we can't have our usual St James' Day party in the Vicarage garden to celebrate. The next challenge - and probably THE priority for the next few years - is to see how we can help this generation of young people to grow into the next stage of their development in faith and stay within the family of the Church.

MY FAVOURITE HYMN

Kerry Sabine writes: My favourite hymn is "Make me a channel of your peace".

I have clear memories of singing it in primary school. As a child I don't think I understood much of its meaning, but I loved the melody and we sang along to it at quite an upbeat tempo.

As an adult I 'rediscovered' the hymn in my mid-twenties and felt the lyrics resonated with my understanding of what it is to be a Christian. God shows his love for the world through our actions. "*Master, grant that I may never seek / so much to be consoled as to console...*" What a mantra to carry through life. It is our imperative as Christians to always ask, not what we can gain from others but, what we can give: consolation, understanding, love. Amen!

For this reason, it was the first hymn that Chris and I had at our wedding at St James' in November 2014. While it can be considered quite a sombre hymn, and I know it is often used at funerals, for me it will always be a happy and hopeful song about our purpose as Christians.

**Make me a channel of your peace.
Where there is hatred, let me bring your love.
Where there is injury, your pardon, Lord;
