REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY Once again the utter calamity of war is filling our TV screens and newspapers. Whereas in the past it has been scenes from the Falklands, Iraq and from Afghanistan, this year the pictures come from the eastern provinces of Ukraine. At 10am, with the help of Junior Church, we are going to try to recall what it is like to have one's family torn apart by the call to fight. We will hear different voices as the tell us what it feels like from each perspective. And we will not just give thanks for their bravery and self-sacrifice, we will also be praying for peace, not just in Ukraine but in every land where violence and war rage. The list is far too long...

PRAYER Last Sunday we took time away from the usual cycle of readings to focus on the time we spend with God in prayer. I am glad that people found the pictures on the big screen helped them to look again at this topic in a different way and I was very moved by the prayers that people pinned to the board afterwards.

CONFIRMATION PROGRAMME 2022/3 As announced we will be welcoming the Bishop of Stepney to St James' for the first time on May 21st next year - in part to administer the sacrament of Confirmation. This is open to all those who are over 18 and who have made their First Holy Communion. A leaflet is now available with the timetable clearly laid out and copies have been sent to all those who are eligible. But this new education programme is also open to any who would like the chance of revisiting some of the major themes of our faith. Monthly meetings on key themes start on Thursday November 24th. 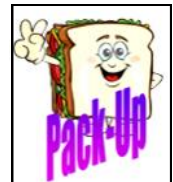
